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Report from the Chairman and Board of Trustees

We make a difference to families affected by blood cancer only thanks to the generosity and dedication of our supporters. We are grateful and touched by those who donated in memory of someone affected by blood cancer, to those who took on a challenge to raise funds for our cause plus all the Trusts and Foundations who have supported our work for many years, and to all individuals who give their time, effort and money with such generosity.

Thank you for your support and for being part of our exciting journey towards improving care for families affected by blood cancers, and in seeking out innovative research and treatment pathways.



New beginnings built on strong foundations

For the last four decades, Leukaemia UK has been making a difference to those living with blood cancer as we understand that behind every diagnosis are families and individuals who need help.

We will support those affected by blood cancer, and their family and friends, through the physical, psychological and financial uncertainty that lies ahead.

For 40 years Leukaemia UK has been working to fund innovative and effective research into finding a cure and better treatments for leukaemia, lymphoma, myeloma and other blood disorders.

In 2017, our 40th anniversary, we looked back over our achievements, and reviewed the context we are working in, in order to develop a strategy and vision for the future which is relevant to patient needs today, and fills gaps in provision. We aim to increase our impact by supporting more families affected by blood cancer and by working with more hospitals around the UK.

2017 felt like the right time to change our name from the Elimination of Leukaemia Fund to Leukaemia UK to help us achieve our ambitions. We still hold tight to the founding principles of this charity which are:

- to improve care and support for people living with blood cancer
- to fund innovative research to find kinder, more effective ways of treating blood cancer

Frontera, a creative digital agency, helped us develop a new name, logo and brand, at no cost to our supporters.

Our new name, Leukaemia UK, reflects our strategic aims to work throughout the UK, working for a blood cancer cure and improved care and also to build awareness of the diseases. Our work continues to cover all blood cancers and blood related disorders.

Our name change took effect in November 2017 and we have been delighted with the overwhelming positive response from our supporters, stakeholders and peers in the field following our rebrand. Our name change didn't affect our charity registration number, office address, bank details or company numbers.

This year has also seen us broaden the skills and experience base of the Trustee Board, bringing on younger members with digital and marketing skills to support our growth and development. Stronger Governance and a great focus on our Board's diversity and skills will add to the charity's ability to develop in the coming year.







How we made a difference in 2017 to families affected by blood cancer

Scientific and Clinical Research

Blood cancer treatments can take their toll on patients and can involve long periods of isolation. Our work is not only focused on research for a cure but also for kinder treatments.

This year we identified an unmet need in the funding of trainee haematologists, just starting out in the specialty, for projects relating to haematological malignancies, or patients suffering from these conditions.

We were looking for bold ideas to not only improve the treatment of patients, but also nurture future talent by providing the applicants with the opportunity to develop the skills and enthusiasm to become haematology researchers and innovators of the future.

Following its very successful pilot in 2017, the programme will be relaunched in 2018 to include nursing staff and Allied Health Professionals in the field. This broadening will not only address an unmet need, but also align more closely with our remit.

"Leukaemia UK kindly provided a small grant to support an iBSc project. Two pieces of work on non-Hodgkin lymphoma concluded in 2017, with one by Dr Robert Carr investigating the recovery rates in young adults attracting international interest, and leveraging in follow-on funding from the Gilead Fellowship. The other, using MRI scanning to identify non-responders has still to report conclusions at time of writing.



Blood Cancer Care Revolution – Mind and Body Team

The key learning from our earlier funding of counsellor posts, and the specialist Teenagers and Young Adults (TYA) Clinical Psychologist at Guys and St Thomas' Trust was the impact made in patients' ability to cope with the harsh treatment regimes and their improved ability to get back to a normal life pathway after treatments. To build further on these positive outcomes we have decided to invest in a significant pilot project at King's College Hospital London, (the first service of its kind) delivering bespoke Mind and Body treatment pathways.

We are funding a multi-disciplinary Mind and Body team headed by a psychiatrist (in liaison with The Maudsley Institute, and under the Mind and Body Programme umbrella at King's), with support from a Consultant Haematologist, Clinical Psychologist, Social Worker and an Allied Health Professional. Training in new care pathways will also be given extensively to existing staff.

Through the Leukaemia UK Mind and Body Team, people affected by blood cancer will routinely receive psychological support where needed. It is hoped that by making emotional support an integral part of everyone's treatment, psychological problems may be identified early or even avoided altogether.

The pilot will be launched in 2018 and will be evaluated in the context of proving that such recognition of the emotional strain and turmoil that any blood cancer treatment regime involves, will

improve outcomes. Assuming the impacts from the pilot are as expected, our ambition is to develop other such programmes throughout the UK.

Helping Hand Fund

We have continued providing financial help to those in need due to their blood cancer diagnosis. Dealing with an unexpected illness can knock life plans off course for a while which can sometimes have significant financial repercussions. We know this can be a real worry. Leukaemia UK is pleased to be able to offer a one-off grant through our Helping Hand Fund to ease families or individuals through a difficult period.

Funding excellent facilities and educational initiatives

Opened in April 2017, we were proud to fund the building and staffing of a new Ambulatory Care Unit which supports patients undergoing transplants on an outpatient basis - yet another major step forward in patient care.

In 2017 we also funded a key educational initiative led by a dietician at Guy's Hospital London for teenagers and young adults affected by blood cancer.



Chief Executive's Update

I am incredibly proud of the step-change in our charity achieved this year. Over its 40 years our charity has set in place some significant foundations of achieving transformational change in the delivery of haematology care at Kings in London our primary partner. Our newly agreed strategy puts this into a wider context of need in the sector, and complements the work of others, whilst staying true to our founders' commitment to improve care for people with any blood cancer or blood related disorder.



I have now set in place the significant internal changes needed to create an efficient and effective 21st charity, and this, which will deliver on our new strategy in the most cost-effective way possible, is what will enable us to grow and engender significant change for blood cancer patients.

The rebranding, and the innovative marketing campaign for the Mind and Body team offered to us by Frontera pro bono is valued at £60,850 in our accounts. The rebranding also gave us the opportunity of building a new website, for which we qualified for grant funding from the Transform Foundation, valued at £18,000. We are extremely grateful for both of these investments, which have helped us build a solid platform for growth, at minimal cost.

We also moved to having a single CRM database to house all our data, which will ensure we are ready for the new GDPR regulations. Whilst it has always been our policy to respect our donors' privacy, and not to share data with outside organisations for marketing purposes, we are now well positioned to handle new regulations, and also to be able to give added stewardship to the donors who so generously support us.

The new branding and charity name 'Leukaemia UK', was well received by our stakeholders and supporters throughout our re-branding process and following our new brand launch. Whilst we have always had 'leukaemia' in our name, we are very much a charity for all blood cancers and blood disorders, and have reflected that in our new strapline 'Blood cancer care and cure'.

Our mission remains firmly to support families affected by blood cancer or other blood related illnesses, by continuing our work in research, care and patient well-being.



We have ambitious plans for next year as we move to implement our new strategy, which combines research with a unique approach to mental health that is our 'Mind and Body Team.' A significant proportion of people with blood cancer suffer from depression, anxiety and loss of control, and some face severe mental and emotional battles to come to terms with their new reality after diagnosis and following recovery.

We have seen clear evidence of the difference made by counselling, as people are taught coping mechanisms, and have a safe space to share their anxieties, since we funded the first dedicated haematology counsellor in the UK around 10 years ago. Such posts are now commonly accepted as part of the treatment pathway. We are now taking this to the next level with our Mind and Body programme, which will provide academic analysis of the impact made by such care, and much better identification of all mental health problems which can so often accompany a cancer diagnosis. We look forward to publishing these findings by 2020.

None of this would be possible without the skills and dedication of our staff, Trustees, and other volunteers, who all bring a particularly valuable contribution in their time and skills. As a charity that is completely reliant on voluntary donations and we are proud of our journey travelled in 2017 thanks to our supporters' generosity.



I'd like to make a special mention of the Hewson family who have supported Leukaemia UK in celebration of their son Carl's life, we have been overwhelmed by Carl's friends and family's fundraising efforts and are so very grateful for their ongoing kind support. Another mention goes to the Ahmidayya Muslim Elders Association who again selected us as one of their chosen charities kindly donating funds for our cause. Thank you to them, and to all of our supporters who make it possible for us a lasting difference to families affected by blood cancer.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment - 50% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
